Art and artists have long been influenced by the landscapes that surround them. They often draw materials, as well as inspiration, from the land itself. We invite you to find both art and inspiration as you travel scenic byways and rural highways through changing landscapes and small communities. Art galleries and craft shops are sprinkled throughout the region in historic downtowns, along backroads, and in the heart of the mountains.

1. Sequoyah Birthplace Museum

This museum celebrates Cherokee history and culture in East Tennessee while honoring Sequoyah, creator of the Cherokee alphabet. Its gift shop has a great selection of authentic Cherokee crafts.

2. Tellico Plains, TN

The town of Tellico Plains is nestled against the mountains at the base of the Cherohala Skyway. Once a logging community, this mountain town is now home to the Cherohala Skyway Visitor Center, the Charles Hall Museum, and an historic downtown full of shops. You can also find lots of places to sit down and have a good hot meal, or pick up something to take with you and have a picnic along the way.

3. Coker Creek, TN

Follow Hwy 68 as it rolls through the mountains into Coker Creek, TN. The roots of traditional arts and crafts run deep in this tight knit community. Woodcarving, basket weaving, and pottery are just a few of the traditional art forms still practiced, taught, and celebrated in gift shops, community centers, festivals, living rooms, and front porches.

The TN/GA state line is represented by a blue line drawn through the town, separating it from its sister town – McCaysville, GA.

Started in 1925, John C. Campbell Folk School provides experiences in non-competitive learning. The Folk School offers year round week-long and weekend classes for adults in craft, art, music, dance, cooking, gardening, nature studies, photography and writing. Visit the Craft Shop to find authentic arts and crafts from more than 300 juried craftspeople. Featuring a large collection of both traditional and contemporary Appalachian craft, including everything from jewelry, pottery, wood, fiber, ironwork, and many other disciplines. The Craft Shop is also home to the world famous Brasstown Carvers. Complete with a book room housing hundreds of instructional books, art supplies, CDs, and even T shirts and hats, you're sure to find the perfect reminder of your trip to this world class facility.

6. Franklin, NC

Known as the Gem Capitol of the World, Franklin is a mountain community rich in gems and minerals and surrounded by mountains, streams and waterfalls. You'll find gem mines located throughout the area. Native stones include ruby, sapphire and garnets. For more information on gem mining you should contact the Franklin Gem & Mineral Museum.

The town of Cherokee is located within the Qualla Boundary land trust and is headquarters for the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians. Here you will not only find finely crafted authentic Cherokee art, but also be able to visit sites where you can see the process by which such crafts are made, and the history and heritage behind the crafts and the people who make them.

Oconaluftee Indian Village allows a glimpse back in time to an active and authentic 1750s Cherokee village. The earliest forms of American craft—pottery, basket making, wood carving and weaving—are demonstrated and sustained here by members of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians. Dog hobble, jelly berry, mockernut hickory and the tree of heaven line the walking trail along with hundreds of flowers, shrubs and ferns.

8. Robbinsville, NC

Resting in the mountains at the North Carolina end of the Cherohala Skyway, Robbinsville is a small town surrounded by the Nantahala National Forest. It is only about 15 miles from the Joyce Kilmer Memorial Forest – set aside to serve as a living memorial to Joyce Kilmer, who was killed in action during World War I, yet was probably best known for his poem “Trees.”

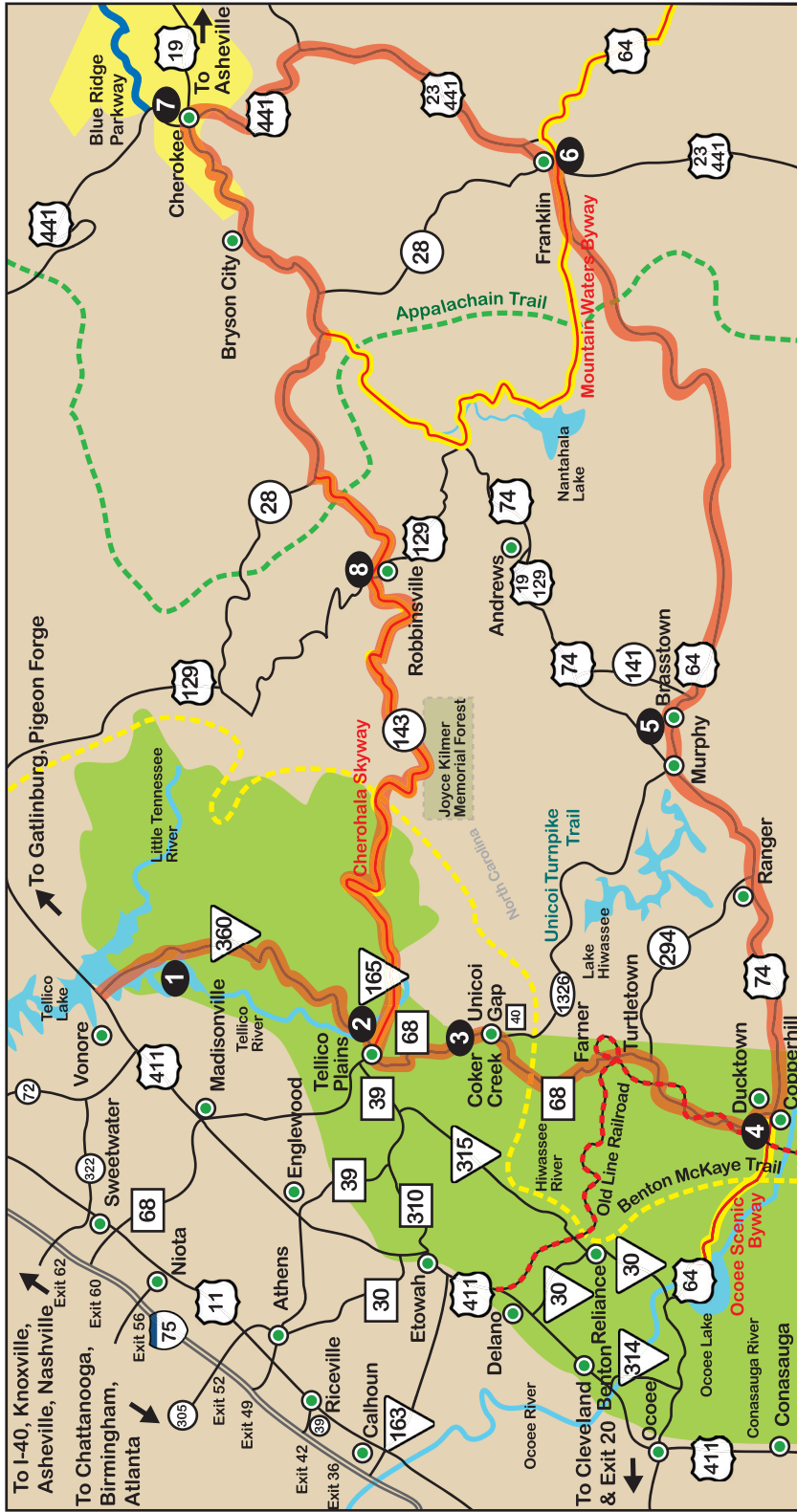
